

HE FIRST county senior hurling final of 1887 was played at Borrisoleigh and Thurles beat North Tipp by 0-3 to 0-0. With so many finals played since then, it is amazing how few draws there have been.

This year's finalists have been involved in county final replays previously, so a second outing for the 2021 title is in their heritage. Strictly speaking, the 2020 decider between Kiladangan and Loughmore-Castleiney finished level, but extra time was played and produced a result on the day. The 1895 decider also finished level, 1-6 each, but Tubberadora beat Suir View by 3-9 to 2-7 after extra time. The full list of county final draws and replays is-

When paying tribute to GAA people who had passed away, Liam was particularly well prepared. That meant a lot to relatives.


Liam was the best stadium announcer in GAA. Wishing him the best in the future.

UPPORTERS with long memories will recall the 2002 semi-final meeting at Templemore, which saw current



selector Eamonn Walsh scoring all three goals in Sarsfields' 3-13 to 4-7 victory. The player was not listed on the match programme, so his appearance at full forward came as a surprise to many.

According to one newspaper's match report he was "the second oldest player on the pitch", (Loughmore-

cation dubbed him "the ageless wonder". Eamonn his trio scored between the 8th and 53rd minutes of the game. There was no happy endina though, because Mullinahone beat Sarsfields in the county final replay.



Attendances

T WILL be interesting to see how today's attendance will compare with the drawn figure of 6,362. In 2002, the Mullinahone v Thurles Sarsfields drawn game drew 9,900 spectators to Semple Stadium and the replay hosted 10,905. Ten years earlier, Toomevara and Thurles Sarsfields attracted 8,000 approx spectators for the drawn game and 8,600 for the replay.

URING the first half of the drawn final, a long range pointed free by Loughmore-Castleiney goalkeeper Aidan McGrath hardly raised an eyebrow. However, with that stroke he became only the second goalkeeper to score in a county final since the Dan Breen Cup was first played for in 1931 – all of ninety years ago.

Aidan played at right half back and also scored a point from a free against Thurles Sarsfields in 2014, the only previous final meeting between the clubs. His achievement two weeks ago links him to Tony

Reddan, whose point from a '65' against Holycross-Ballycahill on October 3rd 1948, had stood in isolation since then. Reddan's point was scored twenty minutes into that final at Nenagh.

Neither Lorrha nor Holycross-Ballycahill had previously won the county title, but the game went in favour of the Mid champions, who captained by Francis Maher, won by 4-10 to 2-4,in front of a 12,000 attendance. Aidan won't mind sharing his recent feat with the late Tony, the Team of the Century and Millenium goalkeeper.

NEUTRAL VIEW

"I THINK Thurles Sarsfields have more room for improvement and I expect to see that from them today. The influence of Ronan Maher and Paddy Creedon is vital for Thurles, so they need to be on the ball more often this time. John McGrath has been scoring freely for Loughmore-Castleiney and Thurles Sarsfields must reduce his contribution from frees and general play. I am looking forward to the midfield battle, where Stephen Cahill and Ciaran Connolly could play a key role for their teams. I think Thurles will need to have more variety in their puck out, create more space up front and perhaps use Billy McCarthy earlier than last day. If they can reduce the free count it might help to tilt the game in their favour ". — (Enda Keane, CJ Kickhams Mullinahone)





"HE recent launch of "All-Star Gazing" written by Eileen and Moira Dunne daughters of the Journalist and Broadcaster, the late Mick Dunne, and based largely on his extensive notes - has been heralded as the definitive book about the long running Awards scheme.

The idea to formalise the scheme, was brought to reality by the four leading GAA Journalists of the time - Mick Dunne (The Irish Press), Paddy Downey (The Irish Times), Padraig Puirseal (The Irish Press) and John D. Hickey (The Irish Independent). The book provides, inter alia, the history of the scheme, contributions from one hundred Award winners, all teams in both codes since the beginning in 1971 and its golden gem, a list of every player ever nominated for an All-Star Award. The book is supported by PwC, who are current sponsors of the All-Stars Scheme.

There was great anticipation throughout Tipperary before the first hurling team was announced, as the Premier county had won the Munster and All-Ireland titles. On October 10th 1971, a representative from Photographic PR Services in Dublin took several photographs of Tadhg O'Connor and Francis Loughnane at Semple Stadium, after they had beaten Borris-Ileigh in the county quarter final. This was a giveaway that both were going to be All-Stars.

On October 19th, the national newspapers carried photographs of the hurling team, which included four Tipperary players, along with a citation detailing why they were chosen.

Tadhg O'Connor (Roscrea) was selected at right half back and his citation read - "For



captaining Tipperary in their recapture of the All Ireland championship. His qualities of leadership and greathearted spirit were repeatedly in evidence throughout the season."

Mick Roche (Carrick Davins) was chosen at centre back and his citation said - "For his memorable performances as one of the hurling perfectionists of his era, his true brilliance comes



to the surface when the competition is at its hottest."



Francis Loughnane (Roscrea) was the right half forward and his citation read – "For his auick incisive forward play. His scoring ability was one of the factors Francis Loughnane enabling his county to

become All Ireland champions in 1971."

Michael 'Babs' Keating (Ballybacon Grange) was centre forward, although his Tipp games were in the full forward line and his citation said - "For his exemplary performance Michael Keating



in recovering his county team place and then becoming the inspiration of his team's many fine achievements during the year."

'Babs' was also chosen as Texaco Hurler of the Year for 1971, with his impressive scoring returns, a major contributory factor to his selection. Fifty years later, these men will always be remembered with appreciation, as Tipperary's first Carrolls Hurling All-Stars.

ANY of Tipperary's hurlers enjoyed their involvement with club and county, but other important outings were in the popular Inter-Firm or Factory Leagues, as they were variously named.

Tipperary was well represented in these competitions over the years. One of the more unusual aspects to this competition, which often dragged into the following year and always depended on a gap in the fixtures calendar to arrange the games, was a Munster final between two companies from the same town.

It happened previously in the 1960s, but fifty years ago, on January 30th 1971, the 1969 Munster final of this competition was played at St Cronan's Park, Roscrea. The venue was appropriate because the opposing teams were Antigen Ltd and Roscrea Bacon Co., both then thriving companies in the town. These, along with Roscrea Meat Products, who lost two All-Ireland finals (1963 and 1967) as Munster champions, enhanced the hurling culture in the town.

It added intrigue to the day that most of the Roscrea senior hurling team, three in a row winners in Tipp the previous October, were involved. The last Saturday of January 1971 was cold, with freezing fog adding to the challenge of the day. John Moloney came from Bansha to referee and had no problems with two committed but sporting teams.


The Roscrea Bacon Co. who had won the 1965 All-Ireland final, beating Clover Meats in the final with a team that included Tipp legend John 'Mackey' McKenna, started as favourites. This was because they seemed to have the greater firepower, with Donie Moloney, Francis Loughnane, Joe Tynan, Roger Ryan, Willie Stapleton, Jackie Hannon,

while Kieran Carey and Patsy Rowland anchored their defence. They had beaten Waterford Glass a week earlier and this was definitely an advantage.

Antigen, who had beaten the previous year's champions, Golden Vale, Charleville en route, included Tadhg Murphy, Mick Hogan, Brendan Maher, Tadhg O'Connor, Pat Dynan, Willie O'Reilly and Joe Cunningham, along with Toomevara's attacking duo Pat McGrath the captain and Dan Kennedy.

The blue and white Bacon Co led at halftime by 1-7 to 1-4, with Francis Loughnane and Joe Cunningham scoring the respective goals. The second half was a ding-dong struggle but Antigen, in their white jerseys with red trim, turned it around, helped by Pat McGrath's goal and edged to victory by 2-9 to 1-11.

Unfortunately, Clover Meats beat Antigen by 3-10 to 3-9 in the All-Ireland final at Nowlan Park on Saturday, April 3rd, 1971. The scorers that day were Pat McGrath 2-1, Tadhg O'Connor and Joe Cunningham 0-3 each, Dan Kennedy 1-0, Pat Dynan and Jackie Shanahan 0-1 each. The Bacon Co. players were disappointed then but returned and beat Grannagh Paper Mills by 5-9 to 2-5 in the All-Ireland final at Nowlan Park on April 22nd 1972. Many people who were involved during their playing careers recall the competition with great fondness.

Sales positions, free of charge may be booked in advance by contacting the organisers before December 4th.





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each venue. After all played each other in each group, the top team qualified for cup semi-final, 2nd team to Shield semi-final and 3rd team to plate semi-final.

In Division 1 Group 1 in Holycross, we had Dúrlas Óg, St Vincent's (Dublin) and James Stephens (Kilkenny). In Group 2 we had JK Brackens, Barntown (Wexford) and Ballygunner (Waterford).

James Stephens and Ballygunner qualified for Cup semi-final with Ballygunner coming out on top on a score of 2-10 to 1-10. St Vincent's and JK Brackens qualified for Shield semi-final with St Vincent's coming out on top 0-9 to 0-7. Dúrlas Óg and Barntown played in Plate semi-final with Barntown coming out on top 1-7 to 0-3.

In Division 1 in Moneygall, we had Arravale Rvs, Moanleen (Limerick) and Clonlara (Clare). In Group 2 we had Ballina, Middleton (Cork) and Clarinbridge (Galway).

Clarinbridge and Monaleen qualified for the Cup semifinal with Clarinbridge coming our on top 0-13 to 0-5. Ballina and Clonlara qualified for Shield semi-final with Ballina winners by 1-9 to 2-5. In the Plate semi-final Midleton beat Arravale Rvs by 0-8 to 1-4.

We started our Division 1 Finals with the Plate final in DMP Middleton v Barntown. Result Middleton 1-8, Barntown 1-5.

We then moved to Semple Stadium for our Division 1 Shield final. After a very exciting game St Vincent's got the better of Ballina 4-7 to 1-6.

Our Division 1 Cup final Clarinbridge v Ballygunner turned out to be a cracker with great young hurling talent on both teams. Clarinbridge came out on top 3-13 to 1-4.

In Division 2 in Borrisoleigh – Group 1 Roscrea, Nass (Kildare) and Bredagh (Down). Group 2 Borris-Ileigh, The Harps (Laois) and Cashel.

Nass and The Harps qualified for the Cup semi-final with The Harps winning 4-9 to 1-3. Bredagh and Cashel qualified for Shield semi-final with Bredagh having a very narrow win 1-3 to 1-2. Roscrea and Borris-lleigh

played Plate semi-final with Roscrea coming out on top 2-6 to 1-5.

In Division 2 in Littleton – Group 1 we had Mullinahone, Raharney (Westmeath) and Drumcullen/ Seir Kieran (Offaly). Group 2 St Mary's Clonmel, Erin's Own/Lavey (Derry) and Oisíns GAC Glenariffe (Antrim).

In the Cup semi-final Oisíns beat Raharney 2-10 to 0-1. In the Shield semi-final Mullinahone beat St Mary's 1-8 to 0-7. In the plate semi-final Erin's Own beat Drumcullen 2-3 to 0-4. Our Division 2 Plate final between Roscrea and Erin Own/Lavey was a very tight affair with Roscrea winning on a score of 1-6 to 0-6. In Division 2 Shield final Mullinahone won over Bredagh by a score of 1-10 to 1-2. In Division 2 Cup final Oisíns GAC defeated The Harps in a very exciting game 2-6 to 1-6.

Well done to our Tipperary teams. We preformed very well considering all visiting team were winners of their County Féile Finals. Winning two All-Ireland Féile titles out of six was a great achievement.

All presentations were made in Semple Stadium by our GAA President Larry McCarthy.

A lot of work and planning went into organising this event by both Tiobraid Árann Coiste na nÓg and our host clubs as was evident by the excellent manner the event went off on the day. It was a massive event and it show-cased Tipperary Coiste na nÓg in a very positive way all over the country – for that I thank everyone who was involved.

To our referees and our field caretakers a massive thank you, only for your cooperation and hard work we could not have run National Féile so successfully.

To coincide with the finals taking place in Semple Stadium, a plaque commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of Féile na nGael and commemorating its founding in 1971 by Séamus Ó Riain, Tomás Ó Baróid and Eamonn de Stafort was unveiled by Uachtarán Labhrás Mac Cartaigh at the entrance to the stadium.







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
